At PDX, food and beverage concessions deliver more than just outstanding meals – they're also serving up an exceptional commitment to reducing food waste and reflecting the environmental values of our community. Together, they divert more than 60 percent of their waste, topping airlines and administrative offices for the best diversion rate in the entire airport. But concessionaires weren't content to rest on their laurels. Instead, they teamed up with the Port of Portland Waste Minimization Team on a study exploring the causes of food waste. The team implemented a survey and conducted interviews and focus groups, revealing insights and solutions that could be applied across the country.

7 Waste Reduction Tips From the Top Team

During research, one concessionaire emerged as the leader in the food waste fight: Mo's Seafood & Chowder. We've got their top tips to take reduction efforts to the next level.

1. Create an employee mentorship program to pair food waste experts with new hires.

2. Offer "two-minute trainings" on topics including storage best practices and portion size.

3. Implement an employee reward system for a job well done.

4. Make posters with food waste opportunities and goals for the next month. Be sure to discuss the results!

5. Take advantage of passenger projections and hourly flight schedules to inform food prep and stocking choices.

6. Focus on grab and go efficiency and only prepare what you think will sell.

7. Get creative – Mo's "upcycles" their cod leftovers into jerky!

Free Speech at PDX Gets Clarification

In late January, PDX was one of many airports faced with large numbers of people arriving at the facility to express their views about President Trump's executive order on immigration. Following the sizable demonstrations, which created significant safety concerns for both passengers and employees, we changed the guidelines for groups of more than 10 people who wish to exercise free speech activities at PDX.

• Free speech permits that designate a Free Speech Zone outside the terminal will now be available. This zone will likely be located on the upper outer roadway because it provides a highly visible covered area with convenient access to and from the MAX light rail platform.

• Roving protests are not allowed at the airport. The Port of Portland cannot allow activity that interferes with airport operations, compromises airport safety and security, or disrupts airport businesses, employees and travelers.

Individuals and organizations frequently use the airport's free speech program, obtaining no-cost permits to express their views and/or hand out materials inside the terminal. The Port elects to provide space for free speech activities, but restricts the time, place and manner in which these activities occur to make sure the airport continues to operate smoothly and safely for those working at and traveling through the airport. Did you know?

Alaska Airlines is bringing four new markets to customers in the Rose City. New seasonal service will include Portland to Philadelphia starting May 22; Portland to Milwaukee, Wis., starting June 5; and Portland to Baltimore starting June 6. New nonstop service between Portland and Albuquerque, N.M., will start Aug. 18 and will operate year-round. PDX has six new buses in service, all of which run on compressed natural gas, a lower-carbon fuel. All 24 of our buses are now equipped with free Wi-Fi and soon we'll have a "next bus" mobile app in place, allowing travelers to track their bus in real time to determine when it will arrive at a nearby shelter.
